FAMED ARTIST'S DAUGHTER, 82, DIES IN ALBANY

Miss Emma J. Twitchell, A Resident Of Delmar Since Last Spring

A resident of Delmar since last spring, Miss Emma Josephine Twitchell, 82, one of two aged sisters who for many years lived together and the memories of a golden yesterday, died Monday in Albany after a long illness. She was one of Albany's few remaining links with a halcyon era in the city's art.

Her father, who died in 1904, was Asa Weston Twitchell, nationally known portrait painter, who was commissioned to do the portraits of several of New York's state's former governors. Many of his paintings still hang in the Capitol and in Albany Institute of History and Art.

Miss Twitchell was born in Hurstville, in the now weatherbeaten farmhouse beside the Albany-Slingerlands road, where her father worked on his portraits. Upon his death Miss Twitchell and her sister continued to make their home in the house. They took particular pride in the portraits that have stood undisturbed some on the walls, some still on easels, since his death.

For years the sisters lived together. Two years ago Miss J. Twitchell died. Her sister remained at the old homestead until last spring when she went to live at Delmar.

Funeral was held yesterday in Tebbutt Memorial chapel, Albany. Burial was in Albany Rural cemetery.

Survivors are a sister, Mrs. Floyd Hayes of Jersey City; four nieces, Mrs. Mary Albright, Mrs. Marion Sprague, Albany; Mrs. Charles Peel, Slingerlands; Mrs. R. Smith, Ohio; and a nephew, Arthur Twitchell, Albany.

Lack PWA Funds For Expansion of School

According to a recent report from Harold I. Jokes, PWA administrator, no PWA funds are available for the Bethlehem Central School District's plan for a larger high school, an addition to the Elmore grade school, and construction of a new grade school at Slingerlands.

Application for the federal grant was filed in July, and voters approved the bond issue two months later. Congress has already appropriated funds for PWA projects, the report states, and the Bethlehem project fits among those for which no funds are available. Applications far exceeded the sum allowed, it was said.
In reply to a query from the Knickerbocker News relative to the lack of funds for the local project, Assistant Administrator H. A. Gray said: "Consequently, substantially all of the money appropriated by the 1938 act has now been allotted and we can offer you no encouragement at the present time regarding an allotment for the Bethlehem project."
