## Three Weed-Plants Harass Gardeners

Creeping speedwell, Japanese knotweed or "Mexican Bamboo", and goutweed are three striking garden plants now considered weeds of the first rank.  
And since spring, Prof. W. C. Muen-scher of the Cornell botany department has been getting inquiries on how to control them. The 2, 4-D weed killers will not kill them. The best control is with ammonium sulfamate.  
These pests have the common habit of spreading by creeping rootstocks taking complete possession of areas where established. A thorough spraying with ammonium sulfamate, usually available as "ammate", will usually kill the plants, roots and all. Spray solutions can be made by dissolving a pound of the chemical in a gallon of water and applied at the rate of one gallon to 100 square feet of area.  
"Ammonium sulfamate must be used with care and kept away from other broad-leaved ornamentals for it is poisonous to other plants. Treat-

ment may also kill most of the grass and clover and produce bare spaces on a lawn. These areas need to be top-dressed at reseeded or replanted with sod. At least three months should elapse before lawns are reseeded or other plants grown on a soil treated with ammonium sulfamate.

Although the plants are attractive, much work may be avoided by not putting these plants in small gardens or restricted areas, Dr. Muen-scher emphasized. They may be useful on steep slopes, along highways or other banks as soil binders but should not be introduced where other ornamentals are desired.

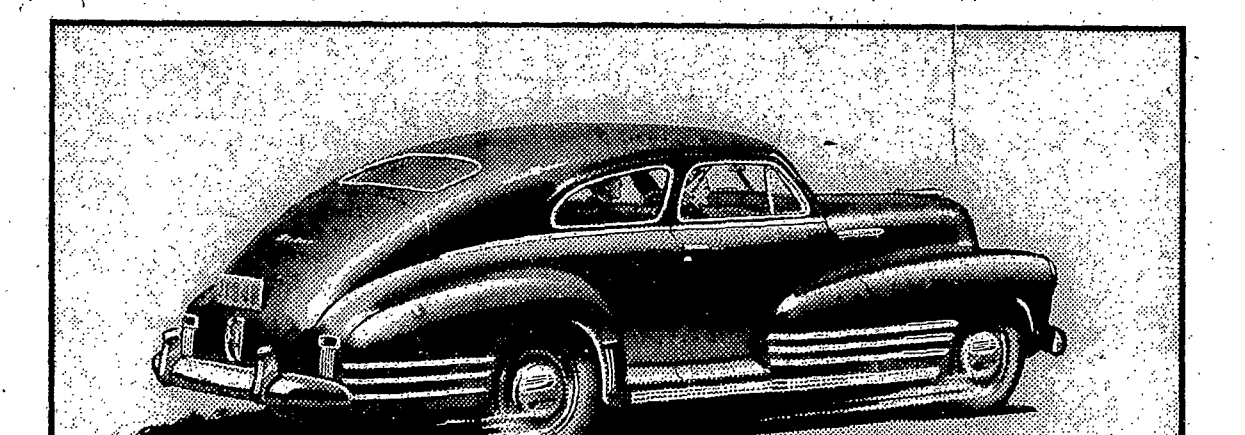
