N. Y. Airmarking Nearly Finished The five year safety campaign to airmark 660 communities in New York state that began in 1948 is a year ahead of schedule and is expected to be completed in the fall of 1952 when the last 80 rooftops are airmarked.

The airmarkers are so located that pilots seeking assistance in navigation are always within ten miles of an airmarked community.

The official state markers consist of bright chrome yellow ten-foot letters on a prominent roof top. These letters include the name of the community and a directional arrow pointing to the nearest airport being used.
